NRA proudly honors Hartzell Cobbs efforts on behalf of rural Americans

The National Rural Health Association (NRHA) honored Hartzell Cobbs, Executive Director, of Mountain States Group, Inc. (MSG) for 16 years with its annual President's Award at the Association's Annual Rural Health Conference on May 4th. MSG has 115 employees with an annual budget of more than \$13 million. The corporation's rural health focus includes the Health Resource and Services Administration's Rural Hospital Performance Improvement (RHPI) program, the Idaho Area Health Education Center (Idaho AHEC), and two National Institutes of Health grants. RHPI has provided tailored technical assistance to 112 rural hospitals. MSG sponsors many additional programs that directly impact the health and well-being of individuals living in diverse rural settings.

"I am humbled and emotional about this selection," Cobbs said. "Since 1974, Mountain States Group has worked in hundreds of communities and rural hospitals both in Idaho and across the nation. Being chosen for this award has caused me to reflect upon how fortunate I am to be a part of an organization like Mountain States Group." Cobbs is also an adjunct professor at Boise State University's graduate school of Health Sciences and has authored the book *Thanatos and the Sage*, about aging and dying in America.

"Hartzell's leadership with the RHPI program ensures its continuing success in strengthening the Delta region's rural hospitals," NRHA President Beth Landon said. "What many people don't realize is that Mountain States Group is far more than rural health in the Mississippi Delta; Hartzell touches lives locally, nationally and internationally." NRHA's Annual Rural Health Conference attracted 900 professionals and students to Miami Beach, FL. In its 32nd year, it is the nation's largest gathering of rural health professionals. HIV & AIDS

Idaho Advisory Council on HIV and AIDS (IACHA)

The purpose of IACHA is to strengthen Idaho's HIV and AIDS care and prevention programs. IACHA participates in the development of the HIV Care and Prevention Comprehensive Plan that is evidence-based, relevant to Idaho's populations at risk of infection and based on meaningful community input.

Integral to the development of the Plan was a needs assessment conducted by Idaho State University's Galen Lewis. The assessment helped identify the two most at-risk groups in each Idaho health district: people living with HIV and AIDS and MSM (men who have sex with men). Equally important to the needs assessment are the follow-up action of the strategic plans that were developed by regional planning groups in each district.

The regional planning groups continue to gather and work towards their goals. Several of the regional planning groups will be involved with HIV testing and prevention messages during the National HIV Testing Day held on June 27th.

Uninsured Children



Making Health Coverage Available to Rural Idaho Children & Teens

Getting health and dental coverage and access to services to uninsured children and youth living in rural Idaho communities can sometimes be a challenge! Over the last three years, through our project, *Healthy Tomorrows: Starting Points for Idaho Youth*, we have looked to our community health care partners in five rural counties to help us reach and enroll uninsured children and youth (birth to 19 years old) who seem to income-qualify for the state Idaho Health Plan: Coverage for Children & Teens. We are inviting our *Frontier Footnotes* readership to join us in our efforts –particularly during the national Back to School outreach effort in August and September 2009. Getting kids health and dental care coverage just makes good cents/sense!

Here are 4 easy ways to help:

1. Publicize the 2009 income guidelines for the Idaho Health Plan. You can obtain Idaho Health Coverage brochures and flyers with the income guidelines by dialing 2-1-1 or 1-800-926-2588 and ask some be sent to you. Many low income, working families in Idaho are eligible for health care coverage for their children and teens and don't know it! (Monthly maximum gross income for a family of four is \$3,400.)
2. Contact Michael Lamm - LammM@dhw.idaho.gov. Let him know how many health coverage applications you need (the number in English and the number in Spanish) and the number of green self-addressed envelopes (for application submittals). He will need a contact and address for mailing.
3. Encourage your patients/clients who think they income-qualify to fill out the application at your office. Have them fill in what they can and mail the application in for them. The Idaho Falls state office will be in touch with your patient for any questions or information that they need to process the application.

Community Health

Idaho Partnership for Hispanic Health *Compañeros en Salud*



Compañeros en Salud is a program focused on reducing the risk for metabolic syndrome among Idaho’s Hispanic population that combines 8 weekly educational group sessions with weekly home visits by local promotores. The program was initially implemented in Weiser, Idaho in the Spring 2008 and had served 38 families to date. Plans include expansion to Mountain Home, Idaho and possibly Wilder and Parma, Idaho. The Idaho Partnership for Hispanic Health also co-sponsors health fairs to gather baseline data on Idaho Hispanics and co-sponsored the Hispanic Health Fair in Nampa in April 2009. One hundred sixty-one Hispanics received screening services through these health fairs to date. Several community educational events have been hosted in Weiser including a presentation by Dr. Lore Wooten on cancer, a presentation on immigration and legal rights by the Center for Community & Justice, and a class on vegetable gardening by MSG’s Katie Painter, who manages the Community Gardens project.

Building Your Medical Home Toolkit- Online Launch June 1, 2009

Brought to you by the AAP/MCHB/National Center for Medical Home Implementation, the Building Your Medical Home Toolkit supports the primary care pediatrician's development and improvement of a pediatric Medical Home. It also prepares a pediatric office to apply for and potentially meet the National Committee for Quality Assurance (NCQA) Physician Practice Connections Patient Centered Medical Home (PPC-PCMH) Recognition program requirements. The Toolkit can help a practice assess and improve its medical home capacity with resources and downloadable tools organized into six building blocks that provide guidance for implementation:

1. Care Partnership Support addresses family access and communication
2. Clinical Care Organization addresses standards for practice organization and use of clinical information
3. Care Delivery Management addresses the promotion of clinical care that is consistent with scientific evidence, as well as patient and family preference
4. Resources and Linkages addresses successfully linking patient and families with community resources to help meet their needs
5. Practice Performance Measurement addresses the organization and promotion of safe and high quality care
6. Payment and Finance addresses the need to match quality care and NCQA recognition with payment and value

Mental Health

The Idaho Peer Specialist Development Project

The Idaho Peer Specialist Development Project is a new program in Idaho that recruits and trains mental health consumers to work in the mental health workforce as certified Peer Specialists. Peer Specialists are utilized to bring the hope of recovery to their peers through sharing their expertise of the lived experience as a person diagnosed with a mental illness. Additionally, they serve as role models for their peers as well as strengthen their own recovery and bring recovery to the mental health system of care. The Project is funded by a grant from the Idaho Department of Health & Welfare. This new program was launched in August 2009. The project worked to recruit and train 14 consumers from around the state of Idaho. These candidates were trained by Larry Fricks and Ike Powell of the Appalachian Consulting Group using a 23 module training curriculum. The training was conducted over a 4 day period with a certification exam 2 weeks post training. Then the newly certified Peer Specialists were interviewed to fill one position in each of the 7 IDHW Mental Health programs. They are serving on each region's Assertive Community Treatment team. The Idaho Peer Specialist Project Coordinator is Martha Ekhoff and her assistant is Jan Carpenter. The Idaho Peer Specialist Project is housed in the Office of Consumer & Family Affairs at Mountain States Group, Inc. The Office is under the directorship of Ms. Ekhoff mekhoff@mtnstatesgroup.org

Idaho State University receives \$1 million traumatic brain injury grant

The national Centers for Disease Control and Prevention estimates as many as 35,000 Idahoans may be living with a severe traumatic brain injury, yet Idaho has few community resources to assist TBI patients after they leave acute-care facilities and return home to live.

Many patients-with health insurance benefits exhausted and unable to work full time-are left with limited funds to cover immediate needs, such as housing or transportation costs, said Russell Spearman, M.Ed., a senior research associate in the Institute of Rural Health at Idaho State University-Boise.

Under the direction of Spearman, Idaho State University and the IRH have been awarded a \$1 million grant by the Maternal and Child Health Bureau of the Health Resources and Services Administration to develop a support network for TBI patients and their families throughout the Gem State. A key component is the creation of a trust fund to help ease the transition from acute care to independent living.

“Our intent is to assist people who’ve experienced a traumatic brain injury over that first hurdle-to provide financial assistance to help them begin living independently,” said Spearman. Once the trust fund is in place, applicants would be awarded funds for a limited period of time after exhausting insurance benefits and other community resources.

University of Idaho

WWAMI Program

University of Idaho and Washington State University are members of **WWAMI**, the University of Washington School of Medicines regional medical education program. WWAMI places special emphasis on meeting the healthcare needs of the Northwest, recognizing the importance of primary care and clinical research, and making public medical education accessible to residents in Washington, Wyoming, Alaska, Montana and Idaho.

Currently, the combined UI and WSU program supports a class of 40 first-year medical students, sharing the resources of the two regional research universities in Moscow and Pullman. Classes, labs, and clinical experiences take place on both campuses and in both communities. Students benefit from the smaller class sizes, compared to a major medical center, and students find easy access to faculty and community preceptors outside of scheduled class times.

Special Programs at WWAMI

Rural/Underserved Opportunities Program (R/UOP)

The Rural and Underserved Opportunities Program was developed to give students the chance to work with a physician preceptor in between their first and second year. The program lasts 4-weeks and is based upon clinic availability. This summer in Idaho, twenty-three medical students are in R/UOP. These medical students are supported, in part, through funding from the Idaho AHEC.

The National Health Service Corps (NHSC) Loan Repayment Opportunity



The National Health Service Corps received \$300 million from the American Reinvestment Recovery Act (Recovery Act) - \$200 million of which will go to support the Loan Repayment Program. Assistance will be offered to more than 3,300 physicians, dentists and other primary care providers who are committed to serve in our nation's neediest communities.

The NHSC Loan Repayment program offers repayment of educational loans for full-time clinicians in exchange for a two year service commitment at an approved site. Up to \$50,000 (less if the total outstanding loan balance is lower than \$50,000) towards qualifying educational loan debt is available. Clinicians who stay at their sites longer may be eligible to apply for additional years of support.

How to Apply: Clinicians can begin applying for this NHSC opportunity on June 2, 2009 at: <http://www.nhsc.hrsa.gov/> . Or for more information, call 1-800-221-9393.

*More than 7,000 already eligible service sites will be able to post significantly more new vacancies and increase the number of clinicians eligible for loan repayment awards at their sites. Additionally, more sites are being approved by the NHSC every day. Sites must apply for NHSC approval.

*Loan repayment awards to primary health care clinician applicants who are interested in loan repayment will be made on a first-come, first-served basis, opening new opportunities for eligible entities located in Health Professional Shortage Areas with lower HPSA scores. Applications will be accepted on an open, continuous basis until all Recovery Act funds are expended - 15 months or sooner.
