The "pipeline" for recruitment and retention in health care professions in Idaho begins in the K-12 years by introducing students to the range of health care professional options and to how health care service delivery works in their community. In this issue of Frontier Footnotes, Idaho AHEC recognizes Idaho HOSA as an important part of this health care professional "pipeline" effort.

Idaho Health Occupations Students of America (HOSA)

HOSA is a national student organization endorsed by the U.S. Department of Education and the Health Science Technology Education Division of ACTE. HOSA's two-fold mission is to promote career opportunities in the health care industry and to enhance the delivery of quality health care to all people. In Idaho, HOSA provides a unique program of leadership development, motivation, and recognition for secondary students enrolled in health occupation programs. Every year, the state HOSA conference in April draws more than 500 Idaho secondary students from the approximately 58 health occupations' programs throughout Idaho. These secondary students compete in venues at the state conference that test their skills and knowledge of the health care field. The top students go on to compete at the national HOSA Conference in the summer. This year's state conference "Through Learning, Practice and Sharing, HOSA's the "Spark" of Caring" is scheduled for April 6-8, 2011 at the Holiday Inn (Vista) in Boise. State Awards

Annual Rural Health Care Access Program Grants Awarded

The Rural Health Care Access Program (RHCAP) recently awarded more than \$115,800 in grants for nine new projects around the state that will focus on improving access to medical and dental care for people living in areas designated as a health professional shortage area (HPSA) or medically underserved area (MUA). Programs who received funding this year were only awarded one year of funding.

This year's funded projects include:

Ashton Memorial, Inc: (Ashton) \$12,400, retain two clinicians with mileage reimbursement support

Benewah Community Hospital: (St. Maries) \$12,400, retain one clinician with student loan repayment

Boundary Community Hospital: (Bonners Ferry) \$25,000, recruit two clinicians for hospital affiliated primary care practice

Family Health Services: (Twin Falls) \$12,400, offset salaries of dentist and dental hygienist in Fairfield dental clinic **Harms Memorial Hospital District:** (American Falls) \$24,800, retain two clinicians with student loan repayment **Oneida County Hospital:** (Malad City) \$5,000, recruit clinician by covering relocation expenses

Regence Caring Foundation: (Boundary, Bonner, Kootenai, Benewah, & Shoshone Counties) \$10,000, fluoride clinic outreach project for low-income children

Shoshone Community Health Clinic: (Osburn) \$4,000, provide stipend for patient assistance volunteer who helps with medication application

Terry Reilly Health Services: (Nampa) \$21,800, promote access and provide comprehensive dental care to neediest dental patients

RHCAP helps rural Idaho communities improve access to healthcare services with grant assistance that is funded through the Idaho Legislature. Improving access to healthcare includes removing barriers that prevent people from obtaining healthcare such as socioeconomic, cultural, and geographic factors, as well as inadequate availability of medical staff. RHCAP awards are limited to \$35,000 a year for a maximum of three years. Applicants must be a governmental or non-profit entity. CURRENT FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES

Loan Repayment Opportunities

The National Health Service Corps Loan Repayment Program provides \$60,000 (or the outstanding balance of qualifying student loans if it is less than \$60,000), tax free, to primary care medical, dental and mental health clinicians in exchange for two years of service at an approved site in a Health Professional Shortage Area for full-time clinicians, and 4 years of service to part-time clinicians with a minimum of 20 hours a week. Upon completion of the service commitment, clinicians may be eligible to apply for additional support for extended service. You may begin the process today – the clinician must apply and be approved, and the site where patient care is provided must also apply and be approved for the clinician to receive funding. The Idaho Rural Physician Incentive Program (RPIP), authorized by the 2003 Idaho Legislature, was established to encourage primary care physicians to practice in medically underserved areas of Idaho. For the purposes of this program, primary care is defined as family medicine, general internal medicine, and general pediatrics, but if there is a demonstrated high level of need in an eligible area, as determined by the oversight committee, may also include obstetrics and gynecology, general psychiatry, general surgery and emergency medicine. Program benefits allow payment of up to \$50,000 in total toward qualified educational loans of participating health professionals over a one to five year period of service in an eligible area of need. Payments are disbursed directly to a physician's lending institution(s) in six-month increments over their designated service period. Disbursements are for \$10,000 for each year of service. Disbursement of funds for loan repayment began in July 2010. Visit the ID. Idaho SEARCH Program is taking applications for 2010-2011 awards

Earn While You Learn! The Idaho SEARCH Program is taking applications from health professions students and residents for participation in a National Health Service Corps program that provides quality clinical training opportunities for students and residents in primary care settings. Four- to six-week rotations provide rich experiences in community health in rural communities throughout Idaho. Participants are paired with a primary care preceptor and a community mentor and are required to complete a community project during the rotation. Stipends of up to \$1,500 are awarded to help with living and travel expenses. Train in multi-disciplinary and multi-cultural environments while earning academic credits and \$\$\$. Only 23 awards remain for the current program year, which ends 9/30/11. Medical and dental students and residents, nurse practitioner, physician assistant, dental hygienist, and masters level behavioral health students are eligible to apply. Sign Up for EHR Incentive Payments!

The first step is sign up to become a WIREC participant. WIREC will ask you to send them some information describing your practice and your needs related to EHR implementation. With that information in hand, the WIREC team can begin to determine the types of assistance your practice will need to reach EHR meaningful use, as well as whether you may qualify for free or reduced-rate participation. **The subsidies will be removed or reduced starting February 2011, so register now to take advantage of this limited opportunity.** Visit the website for WIREC (WA & ID Regional Extension Center) at <u>http://www.wirecqh.org/</u> <u>apply.cfm</u> for more information

PECOS record required for providers intending to apply for incentive payments

CMS will be using the Medicare Provider Enrollment, Chain, and Ownership System (PECOS) to verify enrollment prior to disbursing Medicare EHR incentive payments. All providers intending to apply for Medicare incentive funding should verify that they have a current PECOS record by completing these steps:

1) Go to the Medicare enrollment report webpage at http://www.cms.gov/

 $\underline{MedicareProviderSupEnroll/06_MedicareOrderingandReferring.asp}$

2) Scroll down the page to see the Downloads listing, open the "Medicare Ordering and Referring File," and look for your own record.

If your name is listed, you have a current PECOS record. (Note: If you have submitted an enrollment application within the last 90 days, your name may not yet be listed. If your recent enrollment application has been accepted for processing by the carrier or A/B MAC, your record will be considered active.)

If your name is not listed, you must complete the related application forms.

Act now to ensure that you are enrolled in PECOS so that your incentive payment is not delayed.

HEALTH CARE CAREERS

Wide Range of Statistics Available on Idaho's Health Care Labor Force

Data maintained by the Idaho Department of Labor and outlined in the newly released Health Care Business Scan provided a very accurate count of jobs throughout the state in the health care sector. Health care jobs jumped nearly 10 percent from 2007 to 2009, an average increase of 5,900. The other three sectors – private education, social services and utilities – added fewer than 1,600 jobs combined. Every other major sector of the private economy lost jobs during the recession. The Health Care Business Scan was developed to determine how accessible the department's statistics on the health care sector are. The information includes types, number and regional location of businesses, employment, occupations, current and projected jobs, job ratios by population and wages and educational requirements. Some occupational data is not available because there are too few jobs for a representative sample. Wage comparisons can be made with national and border state averages.
